## Maeystown Preservation Society

### Twenty-Seventh Annual Maeystown Oktoberfest Set for Sunday, October 14

On Sunday, October 14, the historic village of Maeystown will host the 27<sup>th</sup> annual Oktoberfest featuring crafts, arts, antiques and food from 9:00-4:00 p.m. at the 1881 stone bridge.

More than 50 artisans and dealers and numerous food stands will be featured. Crafts will include rug weaving, soap making, artists, woodworking and a country store.

Food will include turtle soup, ham and beans, and popcorn cooked in old-fashioned kettles. Bratwurst, potato pancakes, funnel cakes, baked goods, apple butter, cider, coffee and soda will also be available.

The village specialty shops, bed & breakfast, restaurant and museum will be open throughout the day. Proceeds from the Oktoberfest will be used by the Maeystown Preservation Society to develop the museum and visitor center in the restored 1859 stone mill.

### Learn to Make Apple Butter

Instruction in the art of making apple butter will be provided at the restored 1859 rock mill in Maeystown on Friday and Saturday, September 28 & 29. Members of the Maeystown Preservation Society will demonstrate various apple peeling and stirring methods in preparation for the 27<sup>th</sup> annual Oktoberfest on Sunday, October 14. Apple peeling will take place at the mill between 8:00-1:00 p.m. on Friday,

September 28. Apple stirring will begin at 6:00 a.m. and go until 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 29. Friends of Maeystown willing to help peel apples or donate two hours of stirring time are asked to contact David Braswell at 618-458-6660.

## Ken Kaufman

As many of you are aware, Ken Kaufman passed away May 7, 2007, in Wichita, Kansas.

Ken was a true friend of Maeystown and did many things for the village while he lived here and during his terms as mayor. Through his efforts Maeystown received several grants for redoing the stone gutters and other projects. Ken was also responsible for upgrading and expanding the water system, creation of a new village park, beginning of the sewer system, and various other projects.

Ken was the founder of the original "Volksblatt", which he later turned over to the Maeystown Preservation Society.

Several members, Anita Muertz, David Braswell, and David and Shirley Asselmeier attended an interment service for Ken's ashes at Sunset Cemetery in St. Louis on June 30, 2007. A luncheon followed the ceremony. Everyone enjoyed visiting with Ken's family and friends to reminisce his wonderful life.

## Donated Item

Recently the Society received the donation of a copy of an old picture of the Maeystown Baseball Club. The date is unknown, but our best guess in regard to the age of the picture, would be late 1800s or early 1900s. We are basing this on the names in the picture and their birthdates and how old they look in the picture.

It is an interesting story how we received the photograph. Larry and Elaine Heatherly, Columbia residents, had the picture in their family. One of the parties in the pictures (Charles Heatherly) is Larry's grandfather. Charles Heatherly lived near the old settlement of Mitchie (located southwest of Maeystown near Outlet and Levee Roads. Mitchie once had a school and a post office.

The Heatherlys knew Ellen Kuergeleis and talked to her about the

picture because they knew she was familiar with Maeystown. A copy of the picture was made and Ellen contacted David Asselmeier to pick up the picture.

The photo will be at the Mill Museum for everyone to see the baseball players pictured in the photograph. The team is wearing complete uniforms including jerseys with the letters "M.B.C." on them and hats. Tradition at the time shows knee-high stockings as part of the uniform.

Team members shown are Ed Maey, George Jobb, Herman Hesterberg, Peter Hoffmann, William Bodenbach, Henry Feldmeier, Gratz Goodmann, Jack Feldmeier, Charles Heatherly, and Louis Zimmer.

## Maeystown Post Office

Maeystown has always been fortunate enough to have a post office even though it was questionable at times whether we would be able to keep it. I am glad it continued to be a part of our village.

My grandfather, Louis Krone, served as postmaster for over 40 years. He was surprised when on a Sunday morning, John Schneider, the Republican committeeman, came to his barber shop and said, "Louie, you've got to be postmaster. Here's the petition for you to circulate." My grandfather protested, saying he didn't have time but his protest was overruled and Conrad Wippermann circulated the petition for him. At that time the post office job was a political position, but both Democrats and Republicans signed the petition. Grandpa was a Republican all his life. He set up the post office in his little store in Maeystown where he was a shoemaker, barber, storekeeper, and postmaster. My grandpa's father

had come over from Germany and had learned the shoemaking trade there. His son Louis was born in the United States and soon learned the shoemaking trade and set up a shop in Maeystown. He did well as there was a need for heavy shoes and boots. The post office was set up in the front of the store behind the counter and the mail slot where people could mail letters from the outside can still be seen on the Krone store building, which is now a shop owned by Delores Guettermann. The post office was open from morning until the little store closed in the late evening. Only once was Louis Krone required to take an exam and that was when Woodrow Wilson became president.

The mail had to be picked up from the train depot at Maeys Station, where the train from St. Louis would deliver it twice a day. When Grandpa was postmaster, a friend of his, John Welsch, who lived down the street, would meet the train and bring the mail to town. The neighboring farmers would bring their five gallon cans containing cream from their farms to the Krone store and Mr. Welsch would take the cans along to Maeys Station to be transported by train to St. Louis. There was a train named "The Dinky" that brought passengers from St. Louis, as some of these people worked in St. Louis all week and would come to Maeystown to see their families on the weekends. They would ride to Maeystown with Mr. Welsch on Friday evening and go back to the depot to board the train on Monday morning to return to work in St. Louis.

After Louis Krone retired, Edwin Pfeifer succeeded him. The post office was moved to the Pfeifer house which is located next to the Corner George Inn. William Lueking succeeded Mr. Pfeifer after he retired. The post office was moved in the Lueking's new house where the Kennedys now reside (next to the present village hall). Mr. Lueking and his wife, Alice, also had a gasoline station and a garage where they would change tires for people and do other light mechanical duties. After Bill

Lueking retired, Lillian Pieper was appointed postmaster and the post office remained in the same house. When Lillian Pieper retired, Jean Rahn became postmaster and the post office remained in the Lueking home until they sold the house. Then the post office was moved to the present location. Jeanne Happel became our postmaster and served until recently when she decided to serve the post office in Baldwin, Illinois. Judy Juelfs is the substitute postmaster at present. When William Lueking was appointed postmaster, the post office, which had been a fourth class post office, was changed to a third class post office. The postmaster then had to have a person to work on Saturday because he was not allowed to work more than five days a week.

Things have changed from the old postal days. The old "Dinky" with its coal-fired engine, its two-passenger cars, and its little red cabooses, has long been retired. The depots that were in all the small towns along the Missouri Pacific rail route no longer exist.

These little buildings were the drop-off points for the passengers, mail, and anything else that was sent on the trains. The only depot remaining in this area is the one in Waterloo, but this building was for the Mobile and Ohio training. This railroad track was removed many years ago and the depot is being used as the Nice Twice Resale Shop.

Trucks began delivering the mail twice a day in the last years that Mr. Lueking was postmaster and have continued to the present time.

The post office has certain hours it is open now and is also closed for the postmaster's lunch break.

Some of the people who substituted on Saturdays and when the postmaster was on vacation were Lillian Pieper, Elfrieda Wetzler, Helen Juelfs Koch, and at present, Judy Juelfs.

I know my grandfather Louis Krone enjoyed the many years he served as postmaster in the village of Maeystown.
