### 30<sup>th</sup> Octoberfest

It is hard to believe, but we will be celebrating the 30<sup>th</sup> Octoberfest on Sunday, October 10<sup>th</sup> featuring crafts, arts, antiques and food from 9:00-4:00 p.m. at the area around the stone mill and bridge.

More than 50 artisans and dealers and numerous food stands will be featured. Crafts will include rug weaving, weaving, artists, woodworking and a country store.

Food will include turtle soup, ham and beans, and popcorn cooked in oldfashioned kettles. Bratwurst, potato pancakes, funnel cakes, baked goods, apple butter, cider, coffee and soda will also be available.

The village specialty shops, bed & breakfast, restaurant and museum will be open throughout the day. Proceeds from the Oktoberfest will be used by the Maeystown Preservation Society to develop and maintain the museum and visitor center in the restored 1859 stone mill

### Learn to Make Apple Butter

Instruction in the art of making apple butter will be provided at the restored 1859 rock mill in Maeystown on Friday and Saturday, September 24 & 25. Members of the Maeystown Preservation Society will demonstrate various apple peeling and stirring methods in preparation for the 30th annual Oktoberfest on Sunday, October 10. Apple peeling will take place at the mill between 8:00-1:00 p.m. on Friday, September 24. Apple butter stirring will begin at 6:00 a.m. and go until 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 25. On July 13, Kenneth Rahn, husband of Jean Rahn and father of Debbie (Terryl) Walster, passed away at his home. He is also survived by a grandson, great grandson, sister and brother. He was a member of several local organizations and loved to hunt and fish.

## Highlights of the Society's Past 30 Years

This Oktoberfest marks the 30<sup>th</sup> annual celebration of our Society and the Oktoberfest. Thought it would be nice to do a short history of the Society in the way of a time line.

 On May 13, 1980, a group of people met at the home of Walter (Pat) and Julia Schulz to organize a historical society in Maeystown. Those in attendance were Walter (Pat) and Julia Schulz, Meta Maeys, Gloria Bundy, Douglas

Clements, Vernon and Joanne Goeddel, Pastor Steven and Deborah Walker and Fred and Lillian Pieper. The following goals were established: (a) preserve character and integrity of Maeystown, (b) encourage preservation of existing village structures, (c) encourage preservation of local customs, traditions and values, (d) promote awareness of Maeystown's heritage, (e) develop an oral history of Maeystown, (f) solicit support in historical endeavors, (g) develop local history files

- In January of 1981 a meeting was held to discuss a Maeystown festival. The festival date was set for October 18, 1981 to be held at the mill, the rock house property and the Ruiz property.
- Attorney Jay Huetsch drew up papers for a not-for-profit corporation.
- Second Sunday in October was set as the permanent date for festival.
- Forty craft stands were at the first Oktoberfest. 1981 receipts were \$2,570.69 with a net profit of \$835.31.
- Membership was 163.
- On April 19, 1983, the Society voted to buy the mill property from Douglas Clements for \$16,000.00.
- In 1987 Gloria Bundy began a "semi occasional" newsletter.
- In 1990 officers were Ron Upchurch, President; Dennis Knobloch Vice President; Rosemarie Upchurch, Treasurer and Joanne Goeddel, Secretary
- In 1990 the two large entrance doors on the front of the mill were closed in with stone to return to original state.

- In 1991, the Mill was connected to the Maeystown water system.
- In 1995 German Dinners were begun.
- In July of 1997 Ken
   Kaufman proposed merging
   his Maeystown Volksblatt
   newspaper into the Society
   and it would become our
   newsletter. The "semi
   occasional" newsletter was
   discontinued.
- Also in 1991, concrete was poured to cover the basement dirt floor and a sink, two restrooms and a water heater were installed.
- In 1994 the Society voted to spend \$10,000.00 for restoration and preservation work on all three floors.
- In August of 1994 the Society applied for a matching grant from the Illinois Department of Tourism.
- The Society also applied to and received from the Internal Revenue Service a fully fledged certification as an IRS 501 (c) (3) corporation
- In June of 1995 the Society was awarded a matching grant of \$19,757.49 from the Illinois Department of Tourism. Funds were used to create a museum and visitor's center on the main level, enclose ceiling on top floor and make ready for additional museum space, heating and air conditioning added on all three floors and kitchen and meeting space in the lower level.
- In 1995 net income from the Oktoberfest was \$8,000.00 and an estimated 9,000 people attended.
- In December of 1997 the Mill restoration was completed.

- In June of 1998 the museum and visitor's center in the Mill was opened to the public.
- In June of 1998, the new Maeystown Post Office opened.
- In November of 1999 it was announced that engineering has begun for the Maeystown bypass to bypass and save the rock bridge.
- October 8 is the 20<sup>th</sup>
   Maeystown Oktoberfest.
- On September 15, 2001, a 120<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration was held for the rock bridge.
- On June 22, 2002, the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Maeystown was celebrated.
- New Maeystown by-pass opened in December of 2003.
- In November of 2004 the new expanded museum opened in the mill.
- On September 10, 2005, the Society celebrated its' 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary with an outside dinner on the mill grounds. Commemorative cancellation stamp is issued by Maeystown Post Office in honor of our anniversary.
