The Old-Fashioned German Christmas will be held from 11:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. The focus of the day will be on German customs and music, as well as, of course, the good food and beauty of the season.

Featured music this year will be provided by the Waterloo strolling brass ensemble from 12:00 noon until 2:00 p.m., by hammered dulcimer favorites Carl Seavers and Jim Abbott from 1:00-5:00 p.m. at the rock mill, by strolling carolers, and by The String Connection in the ballroom of the Corner George Inn at 1:30 p.m. There will also be a German Christmas Carol Sing in the ballroom of the inn at 3:00 p.m. and a traditional carol sing at 4:30 p.m. at the rock mill. The village Weihnachtsbaum will also be lighted during the traditional carol sing.

A new activity this year will be provided by the St. John UCC Sunday School at the church hall. They will have a puppet show at various times throughout the afternoon, will offer children the opportunity to make a holiday craft, and will have various candies for sale. These activities will be fun for children of all ages.

The Maeystown Women's Club will provide a Taste of Christmas Dessert Sampling in the basement of the rock mill throughout the day. The St John Adult Choir will be serving Weihnachts-stew, bratwurst and hot dogs outside at the corner of Main and Mill. Traditional Gluehwein and other tasty treats will be served at the Village Kaffeehaus and the Sweet

Shophe will offer stollen and other baked goods and candies.

Maeystown Street Lamps

At one of our gatherings a couple of months ago for some reason the subject of street lights in Maeystown came up. There apparently were street lamps in Maeystown before electricity came to Maeystown in 1938.

Someone recalled that at one time, before electricity, there were street lamps in Maeystown that were apparently large kerosene type lanterns. Someone mentioned that some had been sold at a sale. Sometime later a few of us were looking at an old enlarged photo of Main Street of Maeystown and noticed a large kerosene lamp on a post about five feet high. The light was between the former Wippermann home and the former William Maey home on the south side of Main Street.

We later found out that some of our members actually had two of these old lamps and member Joanne Goeddel remembered that there was one in her family that had been converted to electricity and was used at her father’s home in Maeystown (Patty Schulz) as a back yard light. When they moved to Waterloo the light went along as a back yard light. Joanne’s nephew, Robert

Schulz of Waterloo, has donated the light to us and we hope to restore it. In looking at the light you can readily see that it is a larger version of a kerosene lamp and has a very large glass chimney on it.

We are glad to have found out about these lamps. Most of us had never heard of them. This information has raised several questions that we hope our members can answer.

- (1) When did these lamps come into use?
- (2) Does anyone know how many there were?
- (3) Does anyone know where they were located?
- (4) Were they owned by the village or individual owners?
- (5) Was there someone who served as the lamplighter or was that job assigned to some individual living near each lamp?
