Annual Fruehlingsfest

The Fruehlingsfest will feature unique antiques from some of the finest dealers in the Midwest. In addition, various local nurseries will be selling annuals, perennials and herbs.

Visitors from Bellheim

A journey through the time to the home of settlers from Bellheim and to see the descendants of the Hoffmann, Sutter, Henerfauth, Job and Doll families. But also to take the chance to meet the descendants of the Jung, Hellmer and Stein families from Waterloo.

On about one year after Shirley and Buzz Asselmeier, and David and Marcia Braswell had visited Bellheim, Germany, a visitor group of six Bellheim citizens came to Maeystown to explore the roots of the co-founders from Bellheim, who immigrated in the middle of the 19th century to USA.

The connection between Maeystown Preservation Society and Bellheim Cultural Association exist since 2012, when Klaus Schäffner and David Asselmeier started a living partnership between MPS and BCA. Thanks to the help of Shirley Asselmeier this connection still is going strong, although David Asselmeier sadly died two years later.

The guests from Bellheim, Klaus, Ute and Dirk Schäffner, Hermann-Josef and Sigrid Schwab and Bernd Schuler arrived at O'Hare Airport Chicago on October 17. From the arrival to the end of the trip, Shirley and Buzz Asselmeier had planned and organized everything in a perfect way. Shirley and Buzz overtook even the responsibility to drive the group the whole way they were together. During the stay in Monroe County, Klaus, Ute and Kirk Schäffner were guests of the Asselmeiers and stayed in the condo of Buzz Asselmeier in Columbia.

The trip in the US started at Chicago, where the group had the chance to visit the most interesting places of Chicago, like Willis Tower, The Loop, Millennium Park, a riverboat tour on the Chicago River and Lake Michigan, as well as many other attractions. Of course a set of famous restaurants were on the program and not only the ladies were fascinated by the variety of shopping temples like Macy's (the old Marshall Field's) and so on.

After the stay at Chicago they went southbound to Columbia with a short break at Springfield, Illinois. This day ended with a restful supper at Shirley Asselmeier's house.

Next morning Grant's Farm and a visitor's tour in Anhueser-Busch Brewery was one of the highlights of the day, followed by a very interesting visit of Rick City at Valmeyer. The daily program ended with a long visit at St. John's Cemetery in Maeystown and Salem Cemetery in Wartburg. In the evening the visitors were invited by the Maeystown Preervation Society for an evening reception and a fantastic dinner at Vici's Front Porch in Maeystown. It was a good possibility to get to know each other first.

On Saturday morning, David Braswell received the visitors in historical clothing for a guided tour in German and English language to present Corner George Inn.

Following, the group went to Prairie du Rocher to visit the historic French Fort du Chartres and had lunch together with some residents from Waterloo, who also are heirs of settlers from Bellheim at Lisa's Bar & Restaurant.

On the way back to Columbia they made another short stop to revisit the Salem Cemetery at Wartburg.

The next day started with an excellent breakfast in the historic dining room of the Corner George Inn, where Marcia and David Braswell presented culinary delights for the guests.

After a tour through Maeystown, the visitors had the honor to take part in a church service at St. John Church with Minister Patrick Poole and together with many members of the Maeystown parish. The service was co-designed by the church choir of St. John under the leadership of Marcia Braswell.

And then came the climax of the program for the visitors. A great reception for all visitors and guests presented and organized by the Maeystown Preservation Society in the

Rock Mill. The members of MPS handed over many novel gifts to the visitors. The visitors as well presented a lot of presents like historical and current maps of Germany and Palatinate, photos of the Evangelical and Catholic churches of Bellheim and a flag of the Bellheim community brought for their hosts.

Many new contacts could be forged, not only to descendants of the families that came to Maeystown, but also to descendants of settlers from Waterloo. Some of the guests promised to visit Bellheim in the near future.

The next Sunday, morning church services at St. Paul United Church in Columbia were attended.

Monday the group made a farewell visit to St. Louis with a walk on the Mississippi River Trail. At the Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery they were witnesses to a spectacular military funeral.

The next day three of the visitors had to say goodbye and left Columbia to fly back home to Germany. Ute and Klaus Schäffner, as well as Bernd Schuler, were prepared to continue the trip together with Shirley and Buzz Asselmeier south to New Orleans. New Orleans was a further highlight of the journey. For two days the travelers explored "The Big Easy". On the way home they made stops at Baton Rouge to visit the State Capitol, Natchez and Jackson, Mississippi. Another night in Columbia and the visitors started the way back, with many souvenirs in the luggage and specially many remaining memories of an unforgettable visit in a faraway, but very grown fond of and amazing familiar community.

These also are especially helpful because they contain information on our Maevstown families who came from this area. Plans are being made to have all our gifts from Bellheim in their own display. Obituary March 2, 1917

Berneking
