Our Latest Acquisition

This fall, the family of Alvin Maeys had an auction in Columbia, Illinois. Looking at the online listing, a band uniform got my attention. The hat had "Diehl's Band" embroidered on it. Knowing that Mr. Maeys (Doc Maeys) had come from Maeystown and knowing that there had been a Diehl's Band here, I was hoping this hat was from that band. According to our files, Alvin Maeys had been a member in both of the Diehl bands. I was somewhat confused because the band jacket at the auction was navy blue with a red cording embroidered on it. In our museum photo, the jacket appeared to be solid. After the picture was enlarged, it was confirmed the band uniform at the Columbia auction was from the Diehl's Concert Band. The very same

day I enlarged the band photo to make comparisons, Dennis Knobloch had thoughtfully emailed me to make sure the Society was aware of the rare find. So at the October Preservation meeting it was then decided to send two of our members to make the auction purchase, and they were successful! The band uniform hat and jacket are in exceptional condition, while the moths have enjoyed the pants. Not only were they able to purchase the uniform, but also the military medical trunk that had belonged to Capt. A.H. Maeyes (Doctor). According to Gloria Bundy's files, it was evident that almost continually there was a band in Maeystown from the 1860's to 1930. "No matter what the German's reason was to immigrate to America, how oppressed he may have been, where he came from or how arduous the journey, one thing engrained in the immigrants was their love for music, dancing, singing and drama. Those early German settlers in Maeystown and the surrounding community were no exception and succeeding generations followed the pattern." Gus Diehl, who was a talented man, a gifted musician and entertainer, played many instruments. Early in life, he gathered friends and family members together to play music. His first group was formed in 1888, and not in the strictest sense a band because the group had among its musicians a man who played an accordion, a bass fiddle, a violin, and a guitar. They played to entertain themselves and their friends. Then in 1905, Diehl's Concert Band was organized. According to their old musical programs, this band was quite professional. They practiced above Maey's Store on Main Street and were transported to different events by a farmer who used his team and wagon. In 1913, Diehl organized a new larger band known as the Maeystown Brass Band. (Dennis and Elaine Knobloch kindly donated the bass drum that belonged to this band.) Because Diehl moved away in 1923, the Maeystown Brass Band was disbanded and the Maeystown Brotherhood Band was

organized. They remained together until 1930.

Many people from the Maeystown community continue to participate in numerous musical activities. We are proud of our musical heritage and quite pleased with our latest acquisition!

Maeystown Rock Bridge in Need of Major Repair

The historic stone arched bridge that marks the entrance to Maeystown, is sorely in need of major repairs and restoration. At this time, the 135 year old bridge has passed Monroe County inspection, but much damage was noted. Due to its age and construction, costly repairs require skilled stonemasons and labor intensive work. Costs are estimated at upwards of \$30,000.

Through donations we have raised enough money to start the first phase of the bridge repair. Sometime soon we will be putting in a culvert to redirect the flow of the water. In order to put the culvert in we had to uncover the flow line. When doing so we found part of the stone gutter that has been covered for many years. We are very excited about this and think it will only add beauty to our town.

We have been very fortunate to receive some donations that have had matching business grants. Also, David Cornell donated his beautiful painting of the Maeystown Bridge to be used in a raffle. Lye Soap

The recipe for lye soap printed below was given by Jean Knobloch. She came across this recipe that had been written by her mother. She remembers making lye soap when they butchered at home. The soap was used to wash stained clothes and if they touched poison ivy.

Cooked Lye Laundry Soap

28 lbs. lard or rinds and scraps from
butchering hogs or tallow from
butchering beef
6 cans lye
6 gallons water
1 pint salt

Cook three hours in an iron kettle outdoors. Stir constantly. Let cool. Cut into bars. Place on wooden boards to dry for about a week.
